## He is risen indeed!

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Jesus Christ.

Just how important is the resurrection to the Christian faith? Without the resurrection, our Christian faith would be just wishful thinking, no better than human resurrection.

better than human philosophies and speculative religions.

In fact, the noted 17th-century philosopher John Locke, some of whose ideas were incorporated into the Declaration of Independence, wrote, "Our Saviour's resurrection is truly of great importance in Christianity, so great that His being or not being the Messiah stands or falls with it."

This Old Testament Scripture passage contains the message of resurrection hope:

"For I know that my Redeemer lives, and at the last he will stand upon the earth. And after my skin has been thus destroyed, yet in my flesh I shall see God, whom I shall see for myself, and my eyes shall behold, and not another. My heart faints within me!" Job 19:25-27

Death has never been the end for the believer, but simply a gateway to eternal life in heaven. Abraham was ready to sacrifice his only son Isaac because in faith:

"He considered that God was able even to raise him from the dead, from which, figuratively speaking, he did receive him back." **Heb. 11:19** 

The Lord assured Daniel that believers live!

"And many of those who sleep in the dust of the earth shall awake, some to everlasting life, and some to shame and everlasting contempt." Dan. 12:2

The resurrection was the focal point of Christ's teaching to the disciples about His sufferings and death:

"And he began to teach them that the Son of Man must suffer many things and be rejected by the elders and the chief priests and the scribes and be killed, and after three days rise again." Mark 8:31

It is therefore completely understandable that Mark and the other three Gospel writers all included a historical account of Jesus' resurrection in their narratives. Paul knew that without the resurrection our salvation could not have been possible (1 Cor. 15). He was also convinced a person couldn't be saved without believing in the resurrection of Jesus:

# Luther and the Gospel

#### The Event

Luther reportedly discovered the Gospel while reading Romans in the tower of the Augustinian cloister. Luther experienced the "true discovery" of the Gospel after intently studying Rom. 1:16-17: "For I am not ashamed of the Gospel, for it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who believes ... as it is written: 'The righteous shall live by faith.'"

His study of the Scriptures brought him to the realization of the differences between the Bible and the practices and teachings of the Roman Catholic Church. And so, the story of the Reformation began.

#### **What Luther Says**

"For a long time I went astray [in the monastery] and didn't know what I was about. To be sure, I knew something, but I didn't know what it was until I came to the text in Rom. 1:17, 'He who through faith is righteous shall live.' That text helped me. But when I discovered the proper distinction—namely, that the law is one thing and the gospel is another—I made myself free.

"God writes the Gospel not in the Bible alone, but also on trees, and in the flowers and clouds and stars. If he (we)

has (have) faith, the believer cannot be restrained. He betrays himself. He breaks out. He confesses and teaches this Gospel to the people at the risk of life itself. You should not believe your conscience and your feelings more than the Word which the Lord who receives sinners preaches to you."

## The LCMS's Doctrinal Position

What Lutherans Teach states that "Lutherans teach (and believe) that no human being can earn or obtain forgiveness of sins or life with God by any human efforts or 'good works." We believe, and the Gospel clearly teaches, that salvation is achieved by the grace of God through faith in Him.

The Gospel is the joyful news that our Lord Jesus Christ has given us complete forgiveness from our sins through His life, death and resurrection. The central and most important teaching in the Bible is the Gospel, the Good News of God's gift of salvation through Jesus Christ.

We believe that the two chief doctrines of Holy Scripture, Law and Gospel, must be constantly and diligently proclaimed. We believe, teach and confess that the Gospel is the heart and center of our Christian faith. The Holy Spirit works through the Word of the Gospel to create and sustain faith in our heart. The Gospel's message is that God forgives us all our sins through Christ, accepts us for His sake as God's children, and out of pure grace, without any merit of our own, saves us.

He talked about Luther's struggle with the Law and his guilt before God until he discovered in Scripture that "The just shall live by faith." The Gospel of God's grace is the one thing Luther kept.

Also highlighting the Reformation was the quartet 4GIVEN from Risen Savior Lutheran Church, Broomfield, Colo., which sang Reformation hymns along with a jazzed-up version of "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God." Accompanying the quartet was pianist, Sandy Meske. Everyone was blown away by Mary Boyle's dramatic presentation of Katie Luther in full custom. She told of her experiences as a nun and how she met Martin Luther and later married him. She also explained all the troubles she went through after Luther's death.

Dr. Nauman Moazzam, an oncologist, spoke about various types of cancer and the treatments used to combat this insidious disease. After lunch, Moazzam was followed by the Rev. Larry McGurer, a local missionary from Peace Lutheran Church, Arvada, Colo. His relational ministry is called "Salt of the Earth Community."
