This year we celebrate 125 years of international mission work in the LCMS! It was in 1894 that Rev. Theodore Naether was called to India

as the Synod's first missionary. His work began with preaching God's Word, establishing Lutheran schools and writing tracts in Tamil, which he had studied in Germany. The 40 tracts written in five years presented opportunities for dialogue with the people.

Missionary work seems "glamorous" to some. Yet that's far from the truth!

Rather, it's often sacrificial.

Pastor Naether was faithful in preaching the truths of God's Word, both Law and Gospel. However, his work was cut short when bubonic plague struck in 1904. Selflessly, he ministered to people who had the plague. When he realized that he was dying, he dressed himself in his white suit in preparation for burial. His pregnant wife remained with him to the end.



Other missionaries and their families have made sacrifices, including experiencing the death of children. Families endure hardships, sometimes threats. Sons and daughters grow up minus the benefits of some of the material things that young people enjoy in the United States. Grandparents and grandchildren forgo years of close contact and the formation of special bonds because they live on different continents. Yet complaints remain minimal.

The purpose of international mission work has always been to share the precious truth of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Our desire is that those of other world religions such as Hinduism, Buddhism, Shintoism or animism will come to know Jesus, that it is only through faith in Him that anyone can be saved.

God has greatly blessed these efforts! Since 1894, international mission work through our church body has grown to 90 nations. In 2019, about 130 missionaries and 200 accompanying family members serve in the international mission field. Missionary work sometimes becomes inter-generational. Missionaries' sons and daughters, who spent their formative years on foreign soil, become missionaries themselves.

Theological education has become a significant part of international mission work. Seminaries and training programs have been developed to train pastors, deaconesses and evangelists in other countries. Short-term mission teams have become increasingly popular; more than 300 individuals

"Welcome to Colorful Colorado." The sign stood out to me as I made my way to my new home. After accepting my first call out of seminary in 2018 to Lutheran Church and School of Messiah in Grand Junction, I really did not know what to expect. I had traveled in the West before — even lived in Utah and California — but, now at my first call, this was bound to be my new home.

With my parents living a 24-hour drive away, it would have been easy to feel a little isolated or stranded out here in the high desert. But this location offers a place to "get away" in a good sense. No matter how far or distant it may seem from the Midwest — separated by mileage and culture — here at Messiah, we offer an outpost for strengthening the faith and Christian community; a place to refresh one another.

Not too long after my move here, I was glad to welcome Rev. Dr. Timothy Sales-

ka, my professor at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis (CSL). In a workshop he presented, he walked us through Psalm 23, making this song we all know and love come alive again. He reminded us that the psalms are prayers that we can pray too; that when we are found "wanting," our Lord Jesus Christ becomes all that we could ever need.

This summer, Rev. Dr. Leopoldo Sanchez, another professor at Concordia Seminary, made the trip out. He offered a summer camp encouraging us to live in the Holy Ghost. It was a time we all needed to learn how to live and rest, to be renewed and defended by our God who dwells in us.

These seminary workshops have allowed our church to become a bridge between the heartland of Missouri Synod Lutheranism and its outskirts. Being the sole LCMS congregation in the area, we need the strength and the support. Our pastors are encouraged, our lay people are taught and we even have a few prospective seminary students who

get first-hand experience learning from professors. But besides providing for our own benefit, we see the need to give you a mountaintop to come to and be refreshed, renewed and strengthened. Whether you're from the area or from elsewhere (we have had visitors from Arizona, Illinois and Kentucky for these workshops), this is a place you can come.

As we continue to grow in our ability to be there for you, we will also have a conference focused on the Reformation this October! Rev. Dr. Bob Rosin, CSL professor emeritus of Historical Theology, has graciously offered to fly out here with his wife to have this fellowship with us and bask in the freedom to witness the colors of Colorado. PALMCON III is Oct. 16-18

The Lutheran Hispanic Missionary Institute (LHMI) is holding its third Partners in Latino Ministry Conference (PALMCON) Oct. 16-18, in El Paso, Texas. PALMCON III will focus on "The Latino Family-Our First Mission Challenge." PALMCON I and PALMCON II, which were held respectively in 2013 and 2016, were well received by participants that included Hispanic ministry workers, missionaries and congregation leaders interested in Latino outreach. The format, which combines presentations from excellent speakers followed by table discussions of related issues, allows participants to gain a wide range of perspectives, insights and resources

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to enhance their ministry efforts. It also provides opportunities for connections to be established between workers who are often isolated from their peers.

The primary speaker is Dr. David Hormachea, missionary, author, pastor and radio personality. He is the founding president of *Regreso al Hogar* (Coming Home), a ministry that focuses on family issues. Additional speakers include Mark

Kempff, a Latin American missionary for 33 years who now serves as assistant director of the Center for Hispanic Studies at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis. After each speaker's presentation, there will be an opportunity for participants to discuss issues raised by or other issues corollary to the presentation. The primary presentation will be in Spanish with translation devices available for English speakers.

Scholarship funds are available to off-set registration fees if local sources are not able to completely cover this professional development opportunity.
