“Magnificat,” in the Order of Vespers. Mary demonstrates knowledge of the truths of God’s Word. God chose a spiritually mature young woman to mother His Son!

Instead of a short trip to the hospital for delivery of her baby, she traveled with Joseph to Bethlehem, a four- or five-day journey. God, who through the prophet Micah foretold the birth of Christ in Bethlehem, orchestrated this trip through Caesar Augustus, who had declared a census (paying taxes), requiring them to go to their hometown. Mary was a strong, young woman!

Mary and Joseph took their responsibility seriously. Can you imagine how frantic they must have been 12 years later when they discovered, after a day’s journey back to Nazareth after celebrating the Passover in Jerusalem, that Jesus was not with His friends? Think what it must have been like for them as they carefully searched through the streets of Jerusalem, knocking on doors and retiring at night with sound sleep eluding them. Had they failed God? It’s little wonder that Mary scolds Jesus when they finally find him in the Temple, sparring with the religious leaders.

Yet, Mary “treasured up all these things in her heart” (Luke 2:51), as she did after the shepherds’ visit to see the newly born Savior, who is Christ the Lord (Luke 2:19).

While we do not worship Mary, she was “blessed among women” as her cousin Elizabeth exclaimed (Luke 1:43). We hold her in high regard. She’s a

Generally speaking, at that time girls married shortly after puberty. While Mary was likely young in physical years, we might imagine that she was advanced beyond her biological age in spiritual wisdom and maturity.

Even though Mary questioned the angel and had to feel overwhelmed, she maintained a willingness to be God’s servant. She took on her new responsi-

bility seriously, considering herself to be a “servant of the Lord” (Luke 1:38).

How did Mary handle the inevitable gossip of a pregnancy outside of marriage in the small town of Nazareth? Can you imagine what other young girls in the community might have thought and said? What was it like for Mary’s parents? Surely, all three of them would have been the talk of the town!

Consider Mary speaking to her cousin Elizabeth, recorded in Luke 1:46-55. We sing these words, now called the

Mission Grant helps children ‘foster faith in the forest’

The LWML Rocky Mountain District at its last convention awarded a \$5,000 “Fostering Faith in the Forest” Mission Grant to Lutheran Valley Retreat (LVR). LVR has for many years served youth at summer camps, offering week-long experiences in nature. Some weeks are specifically reserved for children in foster care and their chaperones. They receive love and attention and learn of Jesus’ saving grace during this time. Many times, as the love of Jesus is shared, a one-on-one encounter from a loving counselor helps a child through a traumatizing period.

A week of camp for one child costs \$350 and includes food, housing, care from counselors, horse rides and basic utilities. This grant would allow 14 to 20 children from foster families with limited income to have a mountain-top experience at camp.


