he Christmas season has ended; over for another year. Or has it? Wait! Christmas continues! What about Jan. 6, frequently called the "Christmas of the Gentiles"?

Epiphany celebrates the coming of the Wise Men to worship the One who is born the King of the Jews.

A shining star led the Magi. It brought them first to Jerusalem, then a few miles further to Bethlehem.

That's amazing! It's incredible how a star brought these men hundreds of miles from the east to Jesus! How could it be? Speculation abounds. One theory suggests that the appearance of the

Furthermore, it is amazing that the Magi knew there was a significance associated with the appearance of the star. They traveled hundreds of miles to Jerusalem to inquire about the location



of the birth of the One who had been born King of the Jews because they had come to worship Him.

Did the Israelites — in captivity in Babylon — speak of their faith and hope in God's provision of a Messiah to come? Was the information of this hope passed down through the generations in a foreign nation? Could these Wise Men be some of those who heard about this hope of a deliverer? No matter how they knew about the Christ, God had to be at work.

God continues to be at work! Epiphany means to make known, to reveal, to make manifest. The celebration of Epiphany makes known that Jesus is for all people. As God made Christ known to the Magi, He continues to work through the Church to make Christ known to the world.

Another intriguing factor: King Herod wanted to know about this King. It's not that he was interested in knowing the One who is the truth, but rather he was being deceitful. His reason for inquiry was to destroy Christ, erroneously thinking this One would be competition for his throne. He didn't understand the spiritual nature of God's kingdom.

Christmas continues! It's the beginning of Christ's journey to complete His mission on earth, that of His suffering and death for the sins of the world. His death and resurrection open the gates of heaven

A Thanksgiving tradition



HE HOLIDAY SEASON COMES WITH MANY TRA-DITIONS, and for Our Father Lutheran Church, Centennial, Colo., spending the Thanksgiving weekend serving meals to people in El Paso, Texas, and Juarez, Mexico, has been a tradition for 24 years.

The members of Our Father work together all year to raise the funds necessary to feed more than 1,000 people in three days. For many of the members who make the long trip from Colorado to west Texas, this mission trip has become a Thanksgiving tradition they cannot imagine not being involved in.

On Thursday, the team joined San Pablo Lutheran Church for a beautiful Thanksgiving service, in which its leader, Carol Hill, shared how much being a part of the Ysleta Lutheran Mission Human Care (YLM) family means to her, and how blessed and thankful she is to her church family for giving of themselves to people they don't know during a time known for family and friends.

With 16 people of all ages on this year's mission team, they were more than ready to get to work soon after arriving

Wednesday evening. From picking up groceries to feed more than 150 on Thursday, and even more families on Friday and Saturday, every single servant worked diligently as soon as they got started early Thursday morning. The young volunteers put together treat bags for children, filling the bags with little wooden cars and candy donated by the children of their congregation from their Halloween stash. The teenagers worked non-stop wrapping up silverware, as well as helping in the kitchen as needed, while the adults did the cooking and baking.

Mireya Loomis, 19, has been helping YLM with the Thanksgiving meals since she was 8 years old.

"We involve the children and teenagers in tasks that they can do," Hill said.
"They feel like they're contributing, and that's exactly what they're doing. Several of these kids look forward to coming—the trip into Anapra and Kilometro is especially exciting for them."

As people arrived and were served with smiles and kindness, it was truly a thankful experience. People sat together and ate while sharing and catching up



with each other. The food was enjoyed, along with the music by Mariachi San Pablo, which was another tradition the Our Father mission team was looking forward to.

It was an exciting weekend for this mission team as they reconnected with people they've built friendships with and made new friends along the way. Even though they only come once a year, connections are easily renewed over the gift of food, and each visit makes those friendships just as sweet as the cake that was served.
