Autumn ushers in a variety of new beginnings — students settle into the new school year, vacations are completed, work becomes more regularized.

Other activities and organizations that have been dormant during the summer emerge with new vigor.

Church life itself takes on a newness. Congregations transition to different worship schedules. New Bible classes offer opportunities for spiritual growth. Sunday school classes, if not held during the summer months, begin again. Confirmation classes start up.

After Labor Day, a spiritual awakening sometimes arises in individuals. This time of year happens to be when people may take interest in establishing, or re-establishing, connection with a church. Those who have been absent



from worship for a period of time return. Others venture out looking for a church for the first time in their lives. As followers of the Lord Jesus, we rejoice when this takes place!

While we desire and encourage church attendance for spiritual growth, the question remains as to how we might best bring about this end result as people venture into our sanctuaries. Pertinent questions for our reflection on this matter include: “How do we treat those who are first-time guests?” and “How do we greet those who have had a lengthy absence from worship?”

Is it possible to be too eager? Yes! Being too eager displays itself when the conversation is more about the church’s need for them than it is about the individuals themselves. If people sense that we are mostly concerned about our worship numbers and our need for their offerings and involvement, we can actually “turn people off.” It’s too fast, too soon!

Consider how you respond to someone who has been absent from church for a period of time. Statements such as “Where have you been?” or “It’s been a long time since we’ve

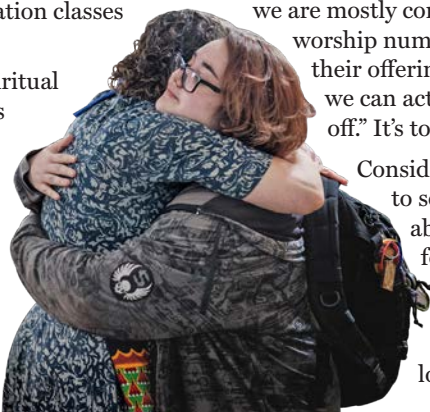
seen you!” might be seen as judgmental. It could also create embarrassment and cause them to not return in the future.

Rather, a warm reception that embraces them with genuine love and understanding will be received much better. Be interested in their welfare and what life has been like over the past months or years. Show empathy rather than judgment as you engage in conversation.

Remember the ultimate reason for which we encourage worship attendance. It is not for the sake of the local congregation, although that can be beneficial. It is for the sake of those coming into the worship space, that they might hear the beautiful truths of God’s words of love, forgiveness and the free gift of salvation. We pray that they will know the peace that comes from God, that they will be encouraged in their faith, and that they will be strengthened to be God’s people in their vocations.

Toward that end result, “Love your neighbor!”

The Retired Rocky Mountain District Educators (RRMDE) held its second luncheon of 2019, at Lutheran High School in Parker, Colo., on June 20.

The topic for the day was "2019 & Beyond: The State of LCMS Early Childhood, Elementary, and High Schools." Presenters included Dan Gehrke, executive director, Colorado Lutheran High School Association; Rev. Paul Albers, district executive for Congregational Services; and Dr. Jonathan Laabs,

executive director, Lutheran Education Association (LEA).

Their informative presentations showed how LCMS schools at home and internationally are doing and what the future holds. Although the present has many sobering challenges for these LCMS schools, the future may bring new and promising growth with God's unforeseen blessings.

To encourage new educators, the LEA

created a "Growing a Teacher" initiative. This project will help cover costs for students in the Concordia University System and at Valparaiso University — who are preparing to become LCMS teachers — to attend the LEA Convocation in St. Louis in October.
